



Introduces the six basic shapes that young children are learning to recognize and name.

Readers must turn the page to reveal each cat's new shape.

Simple text, bright colors and visual humor are just right for young children.

Summary

The contortionist antics of some sly cats help teach babies and toddlers about shapes in this charming board book.

Clever and mischievous cats take on different shapes in this adorable concept board book. A curious cat climbs into a box to investigate and forms the shape of a SQUARE. A thirsty cat crawls into a bathroom sink to get a drink and spreads into an OVAL. A sneaky cat slips into a drawer to take a nap and stretches into a RECTANGLE. And, at the end of the day, all the cats cuddling together take on the best shape of all: the shape of their owner's HEART!

Award-winning author and illustrator Aidan Cassie really gets how cats behave — and what amuses very young children! Using simple text, bright colors and spot-on visual humor, Cassie showcases six different cats morphing into the six basic shapes that babies and toddlers are learning to recognize and name. For each one, the cat is shown approaching or near its target on the right side of a spread, with intriguing text: "A curious cat can be a ..." Turn the page, and the left side of the next spread reveals where the cat landed, and in what shape: in this case, "SQUARE." The cat and its shape-shifting behavior are the whole focus of each of the illustrations. Small children will delight in this age-appropriate introduction to shapes, sure to become a new favorite read-aloud!


Contributor Bio

Summary

A very unusual-looking fish has a journey of self-discovery in this hilarious and heartfelt picture book.

Buttfish's face looks like a bum. Everyone says so. Buttfish usually just tries to make the other fish laugh to keep them from making fun of him. But, tired of being the butt of every joke, he decides to try to find another part of the sea where he can make a fresh start. As Buttfish descends farther and farther below the surface, he sees many other strange-looking fish. He even meets one shaped like a wedge of cheese! These fish don't seem to mind how he looks. One even tells him he looks like a heart, which, he realizes, he does when he's turned upside-down! Maybe life can be good for Buttfish after all!


Pauline Pinson's lighthearted story is essentially about loving and even celebrating yourself just the way you are. With its laugh-out-loud humor, highly relatable and appealing characters and the repeated mention of bums, it's sure to be a hit at story time. Illustrator Magali Le Huche's adorable pink Buttfish along with her other multicolored deep-sea creatures will win the hearts of readers. This delightful book would work well for conversations on the value in differences and individuality, being true to yourself, having new experiences and looking at things from a new perspective. It supports social-emotional learning and character education lessons with themes of self-respect, feeling different and resilience.

I Will Not Walk to School

With an absurdity and nuttiness reminiscent of Mo Willems, this book will keep readers laughing out loud, unable to resist Monster's hilarious antics as he sticks to his promise! Kelly Collier's playful illustrations perfectly capture the emotional state of Monster and of Bird's growing exasperation. While books about going to school are perennial favorites, this one's focus on simply getting there sets it apart from other picture books about school readiness. It's just the right weekday morning story for children who are delaying their own walks to school ... and looking for ways to make them more fun!



Summary

A little girl's big ego meets its match in this fun, clever take on learning to share the spotlight.

No one wants to play with Philomena, and she knows why: it's the big, bad Mimi. Whenever someone starts talking, the Mimi shows up, and it becomes impossible for Philomena to not talk about herself. "ME, too! Watch ME! Listen to ME!" It's becoming a problem - for everyone. Philomena is desperate to for the big, bad Mimi to go away so the other children will play with her again. So she's thrilled when her teacher tells her there's a powerful creature that can chase away the big, bad Mimi for good. When Philomena finally encounters this creature, she discovers why listening to what others have to say is a skill worth practicing.

Author Geneviève Jannelle shows young children how caring conquers ego in this enchanting picture book. By depicting the relatable impulse to be self-centered as a fictional creature, Jannelle helps children see this impulse as something they can manage, encouraging them to build empathy, listening skills and understanding. The story offers a practical suggestion to decenter oneself from a conversation - simply say, "And you?" - that readers will be eager to try themselves! Illustrator Jasmine Mirra Turcotte uses a soft palette to depict the big, bad Mimi as something akin to a butterfly that hovers nearby, growing and shrinking in size, with a tentacle that attaches to Philomena's belly button. This practical social-emotional learning tool for both the classroom and at home is also a wonderful read-aloud.



Key Selling Points

A poetic story that many children with family heritage somewhere else can relate to. Expressive, rhythmic text and the repetition of the refrain "when we go home" makes a great read-aloud.

Perfect to spark meaningful discussions about what home is.

Summary

A touching and warmhearted picture book that explores what it means to belong to two cultures.

Marlee's parents are excited. "We are going back home!" they tell her and her brother. "Not my home," Marlee says. She knows the island is where her mum and dad grew up, and that she and her brother will get to do lots of fun things when they visit. But she's never been there. And though her dad says a person can have two home countries, Marlee isn't sure she believes him. But slowly, the warm welcome from her large, loving family, the coconut water she drinks on the beach and the many other delights she discovers on the island, from pigs on the beach to music at bedtime, help Marlee see that what her dad says is true.

Heather Beaumont's poetic story portrays an experience that many children with family heritage in another country or culture can relate to, and it affirms the experience in loving detail. The book's expressive, rhythmic text, using the refrain "when we go home," and the rich, vibrant art by Nátali de Mello make it an excellent read-aloud choice. Perfect to spark meaningful discussions about what home can be, it highlights for young children what a treasure it is to have a family and a place - or two - that feels like home. The book also lovingly captures aspects of life on a Caribbean island, from the food to the music to the beach.

Size isn't everything. Especially when it comes to Worm, who's willing to stretch his limits to get the job done!


Worm loves being a librarian but has decided it's time for a new job. He considers many options - lifeguard, deep-sea fisherman, window washer - but none of them quite fits his, um, skill set. Until he comes across a posting looking for a courageous security guard to keep a thief from stealing the Invention Convention's exhibits during the night. It sounds like the perfect job for him! Unfortunately, the hiring manager doesn't agree. Worm is too small! Also, he's a worm. Can Worm convince the manager he's got what it takes? And, if he does get hired, will he really be able to capture the dastardly thief?

Award-winning author Maureen Fergus's story about the loveable, winsome Worm is just the right kind of absurd to tickle the funny bones of young children everywhere. With his outsized self-confidence and can-do spirit, Worm is sure to steal their hearts as well. Some facts about worms are introduced right into the story, such as when Worm sells himself to the manager by asking, "Can you survive being cut in half, eat your own weight in soil every day and turn kitchen scraps into valuable fertilizer?" Award-winning illustrator Paul G. Hammond's artwork is packed with loads of clever details (and hilarious inventions!) and manages to make Worm the star of every page, even as he's interacting with the much larger creatures in the human world. This is a great story for character education lessons on optimism and perseverance.

Summary

Delight in the ringing of ankle bells and the swish of colorful scarves as Bollywood dance is described in playful rhymes.

Two sisters arrive for the Masala Magic Dance Recital. They join the other performers to get ready. "Rustle, hustle." And watch the opening act. "Wiggle, giggle." Then it's older sister's turn. "Flickity-flip. Thumka-hip." The families in the audience join in. "Toes tap. Hands clap." It's a wonderful time. Until ... uh-oh. Younger sister has second thoughts about performing! "Heart-stopping." With a gift and a bit of encouragement from older sister, little sister steps on stage. "Thumka-hip. Flickity-flip." The audience is invited to participate. "Hustle, rustle." And soon everyone is dancing to the Bollywood beat!

The joy is infectious in author Anita Yasuda's lyrical romp of a picture book, and children won't be able to resist dancing along! Bollywood culture is on full display in this delightful celebration of family, tradition and dance. Yasuda cleverly repeats the same rhymes from the first part of the story in reverse order to tell the second part of the story. The deep, rich colors in Devika Oza's mesmerizing art bring the dance recital to life, exquisitely conveying the movement and emotions of the dancers and the audience, as well the street where the recital is set. The back matter includes a brief glossary of terms.


Contributor Bio

Summary

A gorgeous and powerful celebration of finding belonging and community.

This poetic picture book begins with an invitation: "Let's go to the Great Gathering Place. Come, I'll take you in my big red canoe." Readers travel along the river to a special place on the shore, where we'll meet and visit with people for hours and days, talking about good things and bad, rejoicing in our good fortune and celebrating our achievements. We'll speak to our ancestors. We'll build a fire and feast. We'll give thanks for our lives. And we'll pledge to always be gentle, generous and kind - and to always love our friends and relatives.

This stirring and lyrical story by Métis author Naomi McIlwraith, based on her poem of the same name, is a moving tribute to Indigenous values and the meeting places that are special to each of us. Luminous illustrations by Cree and Métis artist Onedove evoke a sense of the sacred with each colorful spread. This is a beautiful picture book that honors the importance of gratitude, generosity, kindness and love for both nature and people, and could serve as a gentle discussion starter on these topics. It's also a reminder that the places where we gather are special and deserve our protection. It provides an excellent introduction to Indigenous concepts and teachings. Cree words and phrases are featured in the text and are supported by a glossary and pronunciation guide.

Naomi McIlwraith is an educator, poet and essayist who works at the Indigenous People's Experience at Fort Edmonton Park. A Métis writer with a Cree, Anishinaabe, Scottish, English and French inheritance, Naomi gratefully uses her education to build a more peaceful world. She lives in amiskwacî-wâskahikan, Plains Cree for Beaver Hills House, also known as Edmonton, Alberta.

Onedove is a Cree and Métis illustrator and designer whose work is inspired by classic illustration and animation from the fifties and sixties. Their art has appeared in galleries from Vancouver to New York and in picture books. They live with their family in Vancouver, British Columbia.

I Built a Rocket Ship

Anna Lazowski, Jennica Lounsbury

Key Selling Points

A powerful, profound and ultimately comforting story for children about honoring someone in their own way.

Who died is left open to interpretation, making the story relatable to different readers and situations.

Summary

A grieving child builds a rocket ship as a way to process feelings. For fans of Oliver Jeffers's *The Heart and the Bottle*.

A young child addresses a loved one who is no longer there, while narrating the process of building a rocket ship in the backyard. Dad is nearby, as the child explains their progress and decisions about what to pack as they build. Musing that something is still missing, the child remembers past building projects, stargazing and a warm and loving relationship with the person they've lost. Now, this person feels as far away as the stars - which is where the rocket is aimed.

Anna Lazowski's powerful and profound story is an emotionally sensitive, child-centered exploration of death and grief. Beautifully told in an understated but immediate narrative voice, and with a soothing refrain of "I built a rocket ship out in the backyard," it's ultimately a comforting story for children about finding their own way to honor someone they've lost. It also serves as a reminder to adults that children grieve in unexpected ways. Who has died is left open to interpretation, making the book relatable to different readers and situations. Jennica Lounsbury's soft-focus illustrations in muted pastels keep the mood gentle and tender. This picture book has excellent connections to social-emotional learning. It's sure to touch the heart of anyone who's ever lost a loved one, even as it celebrates the memories they hold dear.


Contributor Bio
